Lesson 11: Taxes

FACT\$:

- April 15, is the annual due date for filing individual returns for federal and most state and local tax returns.
- Every US citizen who is earning a salary or money from consulting, selling homemade items, or self-employment in this country is required to be reported on a federal income tax return. Some factors taken into account are gross income, filing status and current age.
- Federal income tax is the tax imposed by the federal government on the income of individuals, corporations, and even trusts and estates.
- Taxable income is the gross income minus allowable tax deductions.
- Child support is not tax-deductible.
- North Dakota employers are required to withhold a portion of the employee's wages earned within the state for payment of income tax. There is no employer withholding tax requirement in South Dakota.

EARNED INCOME CREDIT (EIC)

The Earned Income Credit (EIC) may provide you an unexpected refund. The Earned Income Tax Credit is a refundable tax credit opportunity. EIC can reduce YOUR federal tax to zero and any unused credit (withheld by your employer) is refunded. But, workers must file a tax return to get the credit even if their income is below the filing requirement. To qualify, workers must have taxable income because they worked or were SELF-EMPLOYED in a business or on a farm.

EIC is an Antipoverty Program

- For tax year 2014, 27.5 million people received about \$66.7 billion in EIC.
- The average amount of EIC paid out in 2014 was more than \$2,400 per applicant.
- One in five people eligible for the EIC do are not aware or do not actually claim it.
- EIC and the CTC, Child Tax Credit, greatly reduce poverty for working families. These working family credits lifted an estimated 9.4 million people out of poverty, including 5 million or more than half of them children.

People who should apply for EIC are:

- people living in rural or reservation areas,
- people who are self-employed,
- individuals with disables,
- people who do not have qualifying children in their home,
- those not proficient in English,
- grandparents raising their grandchildren, and/or
- persons recently divorced, unemployed, or experienced a parental status change.

WONDER WHAT THE IMPACT OF TAXES ARE?

How Does the Federal Government Spend Your Tax Dollars:

- Defense and International Security 19%
- Social Security 24%
- Medicare, Medicaid, Children's Health Insurance Programs **22%**
- Safety Net Programs 12%
- Interest on the Debt 6%
- Other Federal Programs 17%

How Do Tax Payers Spend Their Refund (Impacting the Local Economy)?

- Pay down debt 30%
- Save or invest it 28%
- Buy Necessities 26%
- Buy luxuries or Vacations 9%
- Not Sure 7%



Taxing Thoughts:

- Employee's gross pay (pay rate x hours worked) minus statutory payroll tax deductions minus voluntary payroll deductions equals Net Pay. Gross pay is reported on a W2 (1099 for self-employed). Those documents are what is used to report taxable income and pay federal taxes.
- Taxes can be filed as Single, Married filing jointly, Married filing separately, Head of Household, or Qualified Widow/er.
- Itemizing deductions means reporting actual expenses for various types of deductions to claim against your tax liability.
- Individuals are entitled to claim a personal exemption for themselves and any dependents they support. The personal exemption acts just like a tax deduction: it reduces your taxable income, so you end up paying taxes on less income.
- Property tax is a tax that is based on the value of property. Generally, the tax is levied by the jurisdiction body where the property is located. Property taxes can be paid to the federal, state or local government.
- Tribal governments receive tax dollars through federal programs, individuals who spend their refund locally, and also levied taxes set by the Tribal Administration.

Lesson 11: Taxes

OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To provide opportunity to discuss why paying taxes is a citizen's responsibility and obligation.
- 2. To identify the differences and relationship between withholding tax and income taxes.
- 3. To understand what earned income credit (EIC) is and how to apply for EIC.
- 4. To provide resources regarding where to access forms and assistance for filing income tax.
- 5. To briefly discuss how tax dollars are spent federally and locally.
- 6. To briefly discuss how tax refunds become part of an individual budget and impact local economics.

PROCEDURE:

- 1. Write objectives on the board.
- 2. Distribute the Lesson 11 Talking Sheet Taxes
- 3. Ask for a volunter to open session with a prayer, announce the session will open with a minute if silence, or verbalize a short (2-3 sentences) to thank the creator for the opportunity to assist in supporting a just society.
- 4. Review the facts, EIC information, and Taxing Thoughts and answer questions participants may ask.
- 5. Facilitate short discussion relating to tax forms and how federal tax dollars support the country's infrastructure.
- 6. Plan an activity for participants to consider their personal tax refund and how they use that in their personal budget.
